

How to Talk Monster Activities/Questions

- 1. How to Talk Monster was originally titled Goop-Zee-Googy! Which title do you like better? Why? And why do you think author Lynn Plourde changed the title?
- 2. Have you learned more than one language? Which language(s)? How hard is it to learn a new language? Is it easier for kids or grown-ups? Make a chart with 5-10 words and write what they are in each language. See example below...
